Below is a repeat of information in the last newsletter:

Last year, we had a brilliant Pantomime come to us in school. Aladdin was a huge success so we have rebooked the Pantomime and we will be hosting Cinderella on December 4th. School will subsidise the cost of the show but we will request a £3 donation per child to help cover the costs involved. We did look at taking the children to see a Pantomime but the costs involved in tickets and transport make this too expensive at over £20 per pupil.

This is a whole school event where children can leave after school and return in their pyjamas for a Christmas film. There is no cost for this and children can bring a drink and snacks with them.



What a brilliant fortnight we have had in Reception. We have been doing lots of work based on the story the Little Red Hen. We have learned the story using actions to help us, labelled the characters and wrote speech bubbles to show what the characters in the story say. The children were super at using the sounds they have been learning to help them. We ended our learning on this story by creating a recipe to help us make bread just like the Little Red Hen does. We sieved, poured and mixed to create the dough then worked hard at kneading the dough. We watched it rise and popped it into the oven. Year 2 News

I can't believe that we have been back to school for eight whole weeks! We have packed so much into that time and Year 2 have made a brilliant start to their learning journey.



You will be pleased to know that we have finally finished our Marvellous Meerkat Fact-Files. The children have worked so hard and took a huge amount of pride in their work. They also used their resilience to keep going (even when their hands hurt!). We moved on to learning about the poet Joshua Seigal (he's not a seagull!) and performing his poem 'A Classroom Speaks'. Miss Gray's reading comprehension group have also finished reading 'The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark'. They took the Accelerated Reader guiz

for the book and absolutely smashed it! Our Year 2 word count is now an impressive 29,318 words.

In maths, we have finished the calculation section of our Big Maths CLIC and we are ready to start looking at SAFE (shape,

amounts, fractions and explaining data). The first area we will be looking at is fractions and we will start by some recapping

of skills from year 1.

Our afternoons have been busy learning more about animals in science. We now know that reptiles have dry scales on their bodies and they need a direct source of heat to be able to survive. This is because they are cold blooded animals. We don't think Ellington is hot enough to attract any reptiles such as crocodiles or chameleons.

In RE with Mrs Redpath, we have explored Islam. We have found out about the five pillars of Islam and we will be doing some more work around this during our inter-faith week, next half term.

Year 3 News

What a busy end to the half term!

In English, we have been working on poetry based on Rachel Rooney's excellent collection of poems, "A Kid in my Class". The children practised and performed the poems with some lovely expression and actions.

In maths, we have started learning about fractions and the children are managing this tricky topic very well.

We had a wonderful time at Ashington Rugby Club on Monday. The children took part in a range of rugby themed games and were an absolute credit to the school.











On Thursday we had a very exciting Design Technology day with a seasonal produce theme. We learnt some food technology skills, producing some delicious fruit tarts.

We have also been busy practising our short piece of drama ready for Friday's Harvest Festival.

Year 4 News

Dear Parents and Carers,

First, I just wanted to say a huge thank you to all parents that attended the Parent Teacher Interviews on Wednesday. It was fantastic to get the chance to tell you how well your children have settled into life in Year 4. Also, thank you to everyone who attended the Harvest Performance. All the children did a fantastic job of learning their lines at home, it made everything run so much easier in the classroom. I have to say how impressed I have been by children taking responsibility for their learning. Finally, before I recap our learning over the past two weeks, I just wanted to wish you all a very happy and restful half term break.

In English, the children have been looking at the performance poetry of Joseph Coelho. We have performed a variety of his poems including 'A Little Bit of Food' and 'The Gingerbread Man'. We have also identified some of the vivid imagery that Joseph Coelho included in his poem Miss Flotsam we then used this to create some artwork based on the images we could imagine. In reading, the children also completed reading The Witches by Roald Dahl. It was a hefty 320 words, so the children have done brilliantly to get through it in a half term and they thoroughly enjoyed it.

In Maths, the children have continued to make very pleasing progress in their CLIC sessions. The main parts of the lesson have focussed on the introduction of column multiplication and short division.

In Art, the children really enjoyed our 'Art Day' on Thursday and Friday afternoon. The children used different grades of pencil to investigate tone and how tone can be used to create 3D shapes. They drew sketches of ribbon to practice this skill. We also used charcoal to create a picture focussing on using tone as well as proportion. Finally, we 'drew with scissors' by creating collages

In Science, the children have learnt to apply their knowledge of classification keys and closed questions to plants. We also completed our end of unit assessment.

In History we have been studying leisure time for children in the Tudor and Victorian era and how this compared to the modern era. This included looking at how Tudor fairs compared to Victorian fairs.










Year 5 News

Just like that... the first half term of the year is complete! The children have worked extremely hard during their first half term of year 5.

In English, we have reached the end of Kensuke's Kingdom. The children have used formal writing techniques and modal verbs to write their very own Desert Island Survival Guide!

In maths, the children maintain their enjoyment with their CLIC sessions and are using all their determination to beat their previous weekly Beat That score. This week we have progress to fractions; where we have been understanding and exploring equivalent fractions. We now know the difference between unit and non-unit fractions and how to make fractions equivalent when given the denominator.



In PE, we have implemented our space awareness, attacking / defending techniques and communication skills into game situations with the attitude to be victorious over the opposing team. We have also been working hard during our circuit training with the hope of improving on our health-related fitness baseline scores, fingers crossed!





In geography, we have concluded our topic 'What is life like in the Alps?' The children compared Innsbruck, a ski resort town in Austria, to Northumberland. Using evidence such as, Alnwick Castle & Gardens, Cragside, Kielder Observatory, Holy Island, Bamburgh Castle and Hadrian's Wall, we decided that Northumberland has much more to offer!

Well done on another fantastic week Year 5! I have been super impressed with all the children this half term; their attitude to learning, their behaviour and their willingness to try their best has collectively made this half term very enjoyable for everyone.

Year 6 News

What a half term it has been! We've been so busy and the children have made a good start to Year 6.

Recently, we had a visit to Cragside, the house in the world to be powered by hydroelectricity during the Victorian era! We explored the grounds and linked in some of our science knowledge when looking at the trees to decide which classification of plant they were. Inside the house, we toured all the rooms and spoke to the guides who shared many interesting facts about the house and little things for us to notice. The staff and other members of the public commented on how polite and well-behaved the children were, therefore highlighting our value of "pride".





Not only that but a few days later, the Red Cross came in to do some first aid training with the children. We were taught CPR, how to use a defibrillator, what we mean by "first aid" and some tips for bumped heads and burns. The children even had a go at using the recovery position to get a casualty on their side if they are unconscious but still breathing. Everyone took part in a positive and enthusiastic way.



In the classroom, we have finished our non-chronological report in English from the point of view of a Victorian charity worker; looked at micro-organisms in science; researched the roles of some key women during WW2; and tackled multiplication of whole numbers as well as decimals in maths - and that's just to name a few!

I hope all the children have a good rest over the half term and come back ready and raring to go!
