He trashed our classroom in week 1 so we made posters to encourage everyone to keep an eye out for him. Last week we used our STEM skills to make boats to help him cross the river without getting eaten by the pesky fox! We had lots of fun exploring different materials that would be best to make boats and then test our boats at the end of the week- they all floated for at least a little while!



This week we the Gingerbread Man sent us a letter to say he was off to travel the world. He has sent us letters, emails and postcards to keep us up to date as he passed through Antarctica, the Caribbean, Alaska and Australia! He sent us clues to let us know where he was and the children had lots of fun guessing where he could be. In maths we have been working hard on number recognition, 2D shapes and doubles, using our fingers to help us recall facts speedily.

We also had a special music lesson this week, we sang some lovely songs thinking about pitch and got to play some musical instruments.



We have started our new unit of work in English, 'Room on the Broom' by Julia Donaldson. The children are really enjoying this book and have so far written fantastic character descriptions for the witch using brilliant adjectives to describe the nouns. In Maths, we have been using number lines to help us work out addition and subtraction equations. The children have had to concentrate hard and read each equation correctly to ensure they are counting on the number line the correct way. We have even been solving some written word problems. Great job!

We have nearly finished our science topic of materials and I must say how impressed I have been with the children's enthusiasm and investigation skills. We have been looking at freezing and melting, floating and sinking and carried out an investigation to see which materials absorb water.

We have had a great start to the term and the children are all ready and raring to learn which is wonderful.

Year 2 News

Year 2 have had a busy week!

Our first week back we won the attendance award in assembly, we claimed our reward this week and enjoyed a lovely story in the library with juice and biscuits!

In English, we have been working together to write a newspaper report on Traction Man, this is our first time writing a newspaper report and we have worked super hard on learning the features - we even learnt a new dance to help us.

We are loving our learning in History, we are working towards answering our big question which is 'How did we learn to fly?' Here are some of the people with historical significance that we have been learning about: The Wright Brothers, Bessie Coleman, Amelia Earhart and Neil Armstrong.

In Science, our new topic this term is materials, we have been on a material hunt and a walk around our local area to see how many different materials we could spot. We have spent time grouping, sorting and learning the properties of different materials as well as looking at what it what it means for a material to be natural, man- made and recyclable. Our Art unit this term links to our learning in science as we are looking at using different materials to make a range of textures, we can't wait to show you our final piece. Year 5 also taught us Ellington's science definition which we have been practising in our own science lessons.

We began our new PSHE unit this week, we are looking at Safety and changes to the body. We began by looking at the difference between surprises and secrets!

In PE we have been working as a team to create a fantastic gymnastics routine, we explored different ways to move in and out of a roll on the floor and on the apparatus then we tried a range of ways to develop our 'linking'. Once we had perfected our routine we performed it for Mrs Curtis who thought it was brilliant! Well done you wonderful gymnasts.

Year 3 News

We have had a busy few weeks to begin the new year.

We have started to learn about lots of new and exciting topics.

In English, we have been reading a poem by Roald Dahl called, 'The Crocodile and the Dentist'. Roald Dahl is one of our favourite authors and we have been working hard to emulate his style, challenging ourselves to use rhyme and rhythm in our own poems.

In maths we have been developing and consolidating our work on using column methods for addition and subtraction. We have been using these techniques to tackle bigger numbers and more complicated exchanges.

In science, we have been really interested in our new topic on rocks. We thoroughly enjoyed observing them closely last week and we have worked hard to sort and group them this week.



Geography is also an exciting topic this half term, we are exploring Antarctica, which links well with the penguin ('Waddle') that we adopted at Christmas time! We have been finding out about climate zones, where Antarctica is in the world and what it looks like.

This week we have also had some interesting and exciting visitors in school, teaching us about railway safety and doing a dance workshop which was great fun.





Year 4 News

Dear Parents and Carers,

Hope you are having a fantastic start to the new year and welcome to our first newsletter of 2024.

It has been an incredibly busy start to the term but the children have settled in really well. We recently completed a practice multiplication check to help prepare for the real thing in the summer and we saw a lot of children make huge progress in learning their times tables. The average score in Autumn was 10 out of 25 it's now 18 out of 25 so we still have a bit of a way to go to hit our target of an average of 21 out of 25.

In PE we had a fantastic workshop with Skip for Life. The children learnt lots of new skills in skipping and I had about 5 children tell me their muscles were sore the next day so it must have been good exercise!

In Maths we have been recapping column methods for addition, subtraction and multiplication. The children are becoming really proficient in these procedures.

In English we have been writing poetry inspired by William Blake's Tyger. The children have generated alliteration, metaphors and similes to use in their poems about an animal they have chosen.

In Science we have investigated melting times in cold water compared to warm water. We have also been learning about the water cycle.

In PSHE we have now completed our unit on health and relationships. We have learnt about how we can take initiative to help reach our goals that will make us happy. We have also looked at types of emotions and we have looked at what is mental health and who can we talk to if we or someone we know is struggling with their mental health.

In RE we have continued to study Hinduism. We have learnt about puja and the items found on a puja plate. We have also learnt about bhajans and how and why Hindus celebrate the festival of Diwali.







Year 5 News

It's been an immensely busy start to the new year and the children have been working incredibly hard which has resulted in a very productive beginning to our spring term.

In English, we thoroughly enjoyed getting into character as a WW1 soldier where we explored informality when writing a letter home to loved one. Recently, we have been looking at the 1944 volcanic eruption of Mount Vesuvius in which we will build up to writing a diary recount of events. The children have been creating expanding noun phrases, metaphors and similes in order to improve their descriptive writing.



In maths, we have been working hard to conquer fractions! The children are confident with recognising and defining fractions less than one, more than one and equal to one. This week we have used common numerators and denominators to calculate equivalent fractions. This has led us to be able to compare, order and calculate a variety of fractions.



Our geography topic this half term is, 'Why are oceans important?' We have explored the five main oceans and located them on a map alongside remembering to label the seven continents. This week, the children have created a chronological report on The Great Barrier Reef. We have learnt how important this marine wonder is as well as understanding its significance to human and animals. Did you know The Great Barrier Reef can be seen from outer space?

In PE, we have enjoyed our outdoor adventurous activities unit where we are developing our communication, cooperation and collaboration skills to be an effective team player during problem solving tasks.

Another excellent week in year 5, keep up the hard work everyone!

Year 6 News

Year 6 have made a good start to 2024.

Over the last few weeks, we have been exploring the Ancient Maya civilisation in history, understanding just how long this historical period lasted for and evaluating some of the challenges they faced living in the rainforest as well as the solutions they came up with. We found that they were very innovative and advanced in their thinking.

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In science, we have looked at the differences between renewable and non-renewable energy sources (which we will also return to in Geography later this year) as well as starting our unit of work on light. We have had a go at drawing ray diagrams in order to demonstrate light travelling in straight lines, explored parts of the eye and understanding the difference between luminous and non-luminous objects.

In English, we are almost finished with our novel, Private Peaceful, and are devastated at the prospect of ending the story; however, we really want to find out what happens to Tommo and Charlie! It's very conflicting!



We have also been exploring the ballad "The Highwayman" by Alfred Noyes. We held a debate to discuss whether Tim was really the one to blame for the deaths of Bess and the Highwayman as well as understanding the features of a diary entry so that we could write one from the point of view of a character involved within the storyline.

The other day, we enjoyed a visit from employees from National Rail as well as the British Transport Police so that we could better understand how to keep ourselves and others safe around railway lines. We were amazed by the speed and power that trains actually possess and know that it is never ok to cross a railway track unless it is safe to do so at a designated crossing area.
