



Labelled Pirate Ship

Stick this side to your book.

Cut out the definition flaps below and fold them in half so they fit on the spaces alongside your ship diagram. Stick them down so that they can be opened to reveal the definition. When you have found the correct name of the feature, close the flap and stick or write the name of the feature on the top. Draw a thick arrow in felt pen to match your definition to the feature on the diagram.

Openings in the hull, which allow the ships cannons to fire outside.

Basket or barrel, lashed to the top of the tallest mast, to give a view of approaching land or a ship-to-ship battle.

The watertight body of a sailing ship.

The system of ropes and cables which support the ships masts and are used to control the sails.

The most forward part of the boat, when it is moving forwards.

Sheets of cotton canvas which use the power of the wind to drive ships forward.

Flag flown to identify a pirate ship. Often, but not always, a skull and crossbones and sometimes coloured red to show that no prisoners would be taken.
