# **Nursery News**

The nursery children have had a busy and exciting start to the new term. We are very impressed with the children and how well they have settled. The children have had a fantastic time exploring our new classroom environment, both indoors and outdoors. We have had great fun outdoors where the children have shown fantastic gross motor skills on the bikes and trikes. A very popular area is our outdoor mud kitchen where the children have enjoyed using the pots, pans and utensils to make mud pies.











We have been spending time getting to know our friends and learning about the rules and routines of nursery. We have also been learning all about our feelings and emotions linking to our whole approach 'The Zones school of Regulation' which uses four colours to help children self-identify how they are feeling. We talked about how we can help ourselves and others when we feel sad, angry or scared as well as what makes us feel happy.



This week in nursery we have been learning all about ourselves. We have been celebrating the similarities and differences between children in our class and we have talked about how we are all unique. We looked carefully at ourselves in the mirror and discussed our features before painting self-portraits for our class display. We also made some funny face biscuits.

What a brilliant start we have made in Reception! The past two weeks have been full of catching up with our friends, settling into our new classroom and learning our new routines. The children have been amazing, I could not be prouder of the start they have made to the new school year.





In literacy, we have been learning all about ourselves and have started to read the story

'Once There Were Giants' by Martin Waddell. We have enjoyed having a guess at what the story would be about using only the title and the clues on the front cover. The little girl in the story started life as a baby, just like us! We used some catalogue to create a list of items that baby's use. We then had a think about how we have changed since we were babies and how we need different things now.

In maths, we have been busy consolidating our knowledge of numbers to 5 to help us in the coming weeks.

We have also been making some jellyfish in our RE work as we have been learning about God the Creator.

A fabulous first fortnight Reception- keep up the great work!









## Year 1 News

We have had a busy 10 days settling into Year 1. The children have settled well into their new class and have adapted to their new whole class teaching lessons. I would like to take this opportunity to say that the transition from EYFS to Year 1 is one of the biggest jumps they will make during their time in education. Please help support us by encouraging them to read daily and complete their homework. The more reading, writing, and number work you support your child with at home, the easier the Autumn term will be for them to settle into their new routines.

We have been busy completing baseline activities in Maths to allow us to fill in any missed gaps in their learning. They have enjoyed our CLIC sessions this week, counting forwards and backwards, doubling and halving and counting how many are altogether.

In English, we have been practising how to form letters correctly. This is one of the most important skills for their writing as the formation taught in year 1 will help with their joining in Summer term and coming years. Please reinforce the correct letter formation at home so this becomes second nature.

We have also started in our new phonics groups. Your child will have received two reading books today to practise at home.

As well as all this we have also started our science topic: The Human Body, RE unit of work: Faith Communities, DT; Windmills, PSHE: Family and Relationships, Geography: What is it like in Ellington as well as having 2 sessions of PE.

# Year 2 News

We have had a super start to our learning journey in Year 2.The children have really impressed Miss Gray and Mrs Curtis which how they have adapted to our new routines.



We have started using our new maths program: Big Maths and are getting to grips with the 'CLIC' sessions where we practise basic skills. In addition (ha ha!) to this, we have been focusing on place value. We have represented numbers in lots of different ways and revised how to say and spell some of the tricky 'teen' numbers.

RWI phonics is back in full swing. Some children, who have completed the programme, are now doing comprehension activities with Miss Gray. We are learning how to retrieve information from a text, by scanning for key words and phrases. Our text this half term is 'The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark' by Jill Tomlinson. Our writing is based on 'Meerkat Mail' by Emily Gravett. We have been gathering vocabulary to support us in writing character descriptions of Sunny (the main character in the story).





In science, we have been bird watchers! We are learning what different groups of animals need to survive and we sat very quietly observing the birds in our school grounds. We saw lots, including a very portly pigeon! There were no penguins to be seen and we decided that this was because they are flightless birds who can't leave their icy habitats in the colder regions of the Southern Hemisphere. We now know that mammals and birds need water, food, shelter and air to be able to survive. This might help us to look after our pets too.

In history, are learning about how schools have changed over time. We would love to know interesting facts about Ellington Primary School if any parents or grandparents are willing to share?

It is great to be back.

# Year 3 News

What a wonderful start to the new school year! There have been lots of smiles and all of the children are settling well into the routines of Year 3.

During the first week the children found out all about our 'Class Hero'; Sir David Attenborough. They also found out more about each other by making a 'Me Museum' to showcase items that were meaningful to them.



This week has been very busy as we have started to learn about lots of interesting new topics. We have started a new book called 'The Tunnel' which sees a brother and sister going on a magical adventure. Our reading lessons this term focus on the book 'Matilda' by Roald Dahl. We also visited the school library on Monday to find another Roald Dahl book for our story time each day; we settled on 'The Twits'.



In maths, we have started the year with lessons to consolidate our knowledge of place value. We have been using practical equipment and different representations to help us.

Afternoons have been fully packed as well! We started our Geography topic by learning about the layers of the Earth. In science, we began learning about the human skeleton and Mrs. Morris was impressed with our existing knowledge. We also had a great time using the Commando Joe's equipment to design our own fitness activities for the class to use.



# Year 4 News

Dear Parents and Carers,

As this is the first newsletter of the academic year, I would just like to say Welcome to Year 4! It has been a brilliant start to the Autumn Term. We have been very busy getting to grips with our learning. The children's behaviour so far has been impeccable and I am incredibly excited for all the learning opportunities the children have coming their way this year. As always, any questions or problems, don't hesitate to catch me at the start or end of a day or send me a message on Class Dojo.

In English, to get back into the swing of writing, we have started to work towards writing a diary entry based on the short animation The Present by Jacob Fray. The children have explored the story by making predictions and summations. They have also used drama activities to get into the mind of the character and think about their thoughts and feelings.

In Maths, we have introduced Big Maths to the children which is our new scheme of work. The children are currently learning about place value of thousands including where to find these numbers on a number line.

In Science we have looked at what makes vertebrates including why mammals are different from birds and fish etc. We have also looked at invertebrates and the differences between insects, spiders and soft bodied invertebrates.

In PE the children had an excellent first swimming lesson as well completing a Commando Joe session based on the explorer Levison Wood. This session aims to build the children's resilience and ability to work in a team (Ellington Champion Values). The children had to use pipes and other materials to transport water from one bucket to another.

A great start to the year. Well done, everyone!







# Year 5 News



What a fantastic start to the academic year we have had in our new class. This week we thoroughly enjoyed a live webinar with our favourite author, SF Said! He spoke to us about his life as an author and the importance of reading and writing. He loved reading Varjak Paw last year and he explained how he created this wonderful story.

In English, we recently watched a short animation called Rock, Paper Scissors which is our first writing stimulus in year 5. We made predictions about the short film and have been exploring how each of the three characters are portrayed.

Our class text for this half term's reading is Kensuke's Kingdom. The children used clues from the front cover, the blurb and the intriguing map on the first page to predict what might happen to Michael, a young boy who ends up ship-wrecked.

In maths, we have completed our baseline tests for Big Maths and will now be focusing on our place value knowledge for a few weeks. We began with 3-digit numbers and are now exploring numbers up to one million. The children have adapted very well to the high expectations of independent work in year 5. We aim to show resilience in order to complete difficult problemsolving tasks.



Our geography unit for this half term is 'What is life like in the Alps?' where we will be starting off by locating the Alps on a world map and then more specifically on a map of Europe. Did you know the Alps are spread across eight countries?

I have been so impressed with the children, their start to year 5 has set the standards very high so long may this continue.

# Year 6 News

Year 6 have made a busy start to the new academic year!

In order to understand our new novel, Another Twist in the Tale by Catherine Bruton, we had to spend some time exploring some fundamental ideas about the Victorians as well as the Dickensian classic, Oliver Twist. Our novel is a "twist" on this important piece of literature and follows the journey of Oliver's little-known sister, Twill Twist. Meanwhile, in our writing, we have been exploring the fairy tales of the Brothers Grimm and how their versions differ from those of Disney.

We also had the pleasure of joining Waterstones online for an interview with author SF Said - renowned for writing such exciting stories as Varjak Paw. Did you know it took him 5 years and 17 drafts before Varjak Paw was finally published? That's resilience for you!



In maths, we have been revising and developing our knowledge of place value as well as completing our first CLIC, SAFE and Learn-Its challenges ready for the start of Big Maths.

History this term is taking us back to World War 2 and we have been exploring the interwar years. We researched some key events in that time period and how they were significant in causing the Second World war. This coincided nicely with our first Commando Joe's session in PE linking with the work of spy, Nancy Wake.
